Is your life in balance?

"And do not seek what you are to eat and what you are to drink, nor be worried. For all the nations of the world seek after these things, and your Father knows that you need them. Instead, seek His kingdom, and these things will be added to you." (Luke 12:29-31)

Do you ever feel a little wobbly? The two things we must keep in balance are the physical and the spiritual. Maintaining balance isn't about staying perfectly still; it's about recognizing when you're getting out of balance, and righting yourself. Keeping your balance isn't a one-time thing, but a consistent effort. If we find ourselves living too much in this world's culture, we are in danger of losing our spiritual balance and falling over a cliff into the world's lies: the Bible is not important, prayer is useless, and worshiping God is not necessary. In the passage above Jesus warns His disciples against livelihood in the world, but they should be seeking to be living as citizens of heaven. This is good advice yet today for all Christians too. Everyone is busy. We are working for a living, caring for one another, taking care of family affairs, going back and forth to the doctor's office, maintaining our home, and much more. We tend to strive to meet the worldly expectations of those around us. Unfortunately, we can find ourselves on a rocky and unsteady path at the edge of a deep chasm of destruction.

Beware of the idolatrous trinity of me, myself, and I. The world values dedicated work, wealth of possessions, self-importance, and of course accepting its worldly ways. We need to know the value of service, but be careful not over value it. Nothing is valuable in and of itself if it is not sanctified by God's Word and prayer. The Apostle Paul reminds us in 2 Corinthians 4:18, that: "...we do not look at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen. For the things which are seen are temporary, but the things which are not seen are eternal."

Have you ever found yourself lightheaded? If so, you know how hard it is to do the basic tasks; try to walk without stumbling, losing your balance and falling. How is your spiritual balance and those that surround you? Perhaps, attending church on Sunday morning and Bible study is not a priority in your life. Guard yourselves so that you do not tumble into despair; dizzied by the world's hatred with charges of racism, political unrest, inflation crisis, abortion debates, food shortages, and terrorists roaming the nation picking their targets seemingly at random. Are you dazed by how quickly you seem to be losing control of your life?

July Voters' Assembly: Highlights from the July 10th meeting are shown below:

The Treasurer's January – June financial report was distributed for review. The income was \$42,036.57, and expenses were \$42,211.79. This is an income of (\$ -175.00) for this 6 month time period. The mortgage balance is \$164,669.35. The General Fund balance is \$50,149.82 with the Memorial/Designated Fund balance of \$13,148.29 for a total of \$63,298.11.

Sophie Cervantez was accepted into the congregation by Baptism.

Ted Sturtevant reported that there was an additional expense of approximately \$300 for the repair of the furnace in February. All the basement florescent light fixtures and ballasts have been repaired this March. In April, the mower had its preseason maintenance and is ready for the cutting season. Currently the lawn and weed control is being done by Gary Hahn and Ted. A load of dirt was received and worked by Gary and Ted to fill holes around the church grounds. The hayfield is being cut and baled by Todd Boar.

The 4th of July concession proceeds were \$167.75. A motion made by Wayne Becker was approved to have a drive-thru Octoberfest this fall. The date to be determined later.

Stewardship Matters: One unfortunate development in Christian churches is that the word "stewardship" has too often been portrayed as just a fancy word for giving money to the church. Stewardship does include offerings, of course, but it is much broader and richer than that. A more accurate synonym is "management" and it refers to how we manage our whole lives: time, ability, vocation and money. It also extends beyond life in the church. In addition to our offerings, how do we manage all the rest of our money? In addition to serving in and through the church, how do we manage all the hours in each day and week? In addition to honoring God in worship, how do we honor Him in our families, our work and our citizenship? The word "stewardship" is a comprehensive term that reminds us that we are not people who include some Christian activities in our lives, but everything we do we do as Christians. Our faith informs and shapes all that we are, do and have.

Q: I see some people in church and pastors sometimes make the sign of the cross. Isn't that a Roman Catholic practice? Why are Lutherans doing it?

A: Making the sign of the cross is a central practice of Roman Catholic piety and, in practice, it has been associated almost entirely with Catholics. It was never intended, however, to be off limits to Lutherans and other Christians. At the time of the Reformation, some good practices were discarded simply because they were "too Catholic." Among them was making the sign of the cross.

Luke 12:51 – "Do you think that I have come to give peace on earth? No, I tell you, but rather division." Jesus has come to divide us out of the world – to carve out a people for Himself, redeemed by His Blood and trusting His Word. The world hates this Word, but for us it is life and salvation. We seek to follow Jesus' Word in all things because we know Him who gave us the Word: we know He always seeks to bless us.
