The Hopes of the Poor Shall Not Perish

"I will give thanks to the LORD with my whole heart; I will recount all of your wonderful deeds. I will be glad and exult in you; I will sing praise to your name, O Most High. For the needy shall not always be forgotten, and the hope of the poor shall not perish forever." (Psalm 9:1,18)

There are many holidays which we may take for granted; such as Memorial Day, 4th of July, Columbus Day, Veterans' Day, Presidents' Day; and, in Illinois, Casmier Pulaski Day. Another holiday which we may tend to take for granted is Thanksgiving Day. We may take these holidays

for granted; yet, none of them are celebrated in the rest of the world. Certainly, other countries have their distinct groups of holidays, but Thanksgiving Day is

Thanksgiving Day is one of those holidays which is distinctly American.

The first Thanksgiving was certainly celebrated in very difficult circumstances. Many of the early American settlers had died from illness and starvation. Those who survived were living in primitive conditions. Their future was uncertain. Yet, they were moved to give thanks for what they *had*, rather than grumble about what they *didn't* have.

We live in times which are difficult for many; yet, we're blessed in material ways far beyond what the Pilgrims experienced. This was brought especially to mind during my recent trip to South Africa. Americans tend to link that country with diamond and gold mining; and there are certainly some prosperous parts of the county. Yet, there also exists high rates of crime, unemployment, AIDS; and vast poverty-stricken regions beyond what

most Americans can imagine.

In terms of crime, it's the rule rather than the exception for houses in South Africa to have bars on their windows and doors; and, where possible, to have a wall surrounding the house—a wall commonly topped with barbed wire or electrified wire

South Africa has the second-highest AIDS rate on the continent of Africa. Whereas the hospice services in the U.S. deal primarily with the victims of illnesses such as cancer and Alzheimer's disease; the hospices in South Africa deal mostly with AIDS patients, and seek to help the young

orphans of those hospice patients who die from AIDS


Regarding poverty, millions of people in South Africa live in what is euphemistically called "Informal

Housing," (shown on the sketches on this page and the next)—tightly packed settlements of crudely-built shacks; each about half the size of one of our single-car garages (but much less sturdy or weather -tight).

Because of demands from the people living in these "Informal Housing" settlements, the government has provided outhouses, and some electrical access in some of these locations. The people living there do menial work, but some obtain enough money to have a television, and a few even have a satellite dish perched on top of the corrugated sheet metal roof of their cramped and dirty shack. Thus, through television, they can glimpse what life is like in the United States, (or at least, how life is portrayed in the United States).

Your life or lifestyle may not match that of what's

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commonly portrayed on television; but even if you've undergone severe economic distress, your way of life doesn't match the life or lifestyle of those living among the crime, AIDS, and crushing poverty in places like South Africa.

There are many reasons for crime, disease, and poverty in South Africa, here, and around the world; but the fundamental reason is sin—our sin, and the sin of all those who have lived before us. God didn't create a world which included crime, disease, and poverty; but He's granted us material blessings in spite of, and in the midst of, these things. Furthermore, God has provided the Means of Grace whereby we can be *strengthened* while living with these problems, and eternally *delivered* from them.

Even considering any current declines in your economic welfare or personal health; you still have much to be thankful for. Our celebration of Thanksgiving started out as being thankful to God for, essentially, conditions which were even worse than those living in the "Informal Housing" which many in the world experience.

Today, we have much more in material blessings than the Pilgrims had, or what most of the rest of the world has. Yet, we still have the temptation to focus on what we *don't* have, rather than on what we *do* have. Certainly, we have genuine needs, and there is genuine poverty. Yet, like the Psalmist, we can say, "I will give thanks to the LORD with my

whole heart; I will recount all of your wonderful deeds. I will be glad and exult in you; I will sing praise to your name, O Most High. For the needy shall not always be forgotten, and the hope of the poor shall not perish forever."

David was looking ahead to the coming of the promised Messiah, Jesus Christ. St. Paul reminds us, "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich" (2 Cor. 8:9)

Due to the effects of sin in this world, "The poor will always be among us" (Mark 14:7); and we ourselves might become poverty-stricken.

Yet, at Thanksgiving, and year-round, we should give thanks for whatever material blessings we have; share with those who have even less; and especially give thanks for the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ. Our Lord left the riches of His heavenly throne, took upon Himself poverty-stricken flesh and blood, that thereby He might *also* take all of our sins upon Himself on the cross so that we might have the *riches* of eternal life in heaven.

Our needs have *not* been forgotten, and we shall *not* perish forever, but we shall forever give thanks to the Lord with our whole heart.

At a recent Church Council meeting, a motion was passed to reach out to every Confirmed member of our congregation. As St. Paul writes, "Therefore encourage one another, and build each other up" (1 Thess. 5:11). It is our prayerful hope that these contacts will strengthen and encourage our family of believers at Faith Lutheran Church.

On either Sunday, Nov. 8th, 6:30 PM; or Sunday, Nov. 15th, 6:30 PM, you are invited and encouraged to come to our Fellowship Hall and view the movie, "The Passion of the Christ."

One Lutheran theologian said regarding these verses:


"The one way is indeed a common road, no one is excluded from it. But it is narrow, with no room for frivolous liberties on either side. And it finally leads through a strait and narrow gate, which has nothing to commend it outwardly. Only comparatively few find this way. It is so untrodden that it may easily be missed.

On the other hand there is a wide, broad, spacious, roomy road, with many factors that invite, that lead forward on that road. And at its end is a wide, welcoming gate. But this way and this gate, with all the qualities that commend them, with all

the invitation to indulge in the free, unfettered life of the world, leads to destruction; its end is everlasting condemnation.

But the other way leads to life, to the true life, to the only life worth living, to the life everlasting. Enter in at this gate, is His loving call. Conquer, in His strength, all weakness of the flesh. Overcome through Him all assaults of the world and Satan, no matter in what guise they may appear. The end is worth a thousand battles"

For the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd; he will lead them to springs of living water, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes" (Rev. 7:14-17).

remember our Christian loved ones who have passed before us, and strengthens our hope in the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting. One of our common table prayers contains these words: "Come, Lord Jesus, be our Guest and may these gifts to us be blessed." The godly ladies who

are part of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) have added these great stewardship thoughts to this prayer: "And may there be a goodly share on every table everywhere, and may we help to put it there."

May God bless us as his stewards so that our management of all of life and life's resources (money, time, talents, relationships, etc.) honors him, blesses our neighbors, and serves as an example and encouragement to those around us.
