What's in it for *Them*?

At last month's Church Council meeting, we were reviewing the results of the Evangelism Fair Booth our congregation had downtown during Hog Days, as well as talking about the possibility of an evangelism emphasis for next year through OAFC. OAFC stands for "Ongoing Ambassadors for Christ," and is a Recognized Service Organization (RSO) of the LCMS; such as is Lutheran Bible

Translators, Camp CILCA, Lutheran Association of Missionaries and Pilots (LAMP); and many other worthwhile mission efforts which provide Christ-centered Lutheran outreach.

OAFC consists primarily of young people who have been trained in evangelism, and assist LCMS congregations with witnessing and canvassing of neighborhoods. We're following-up on having an "OAFC Weekend" here next year; but in the

course of the discussion, questions were raised about whether we would get any new members out of such an effort. I briefly addressed the purposes of our Evangelism Committee, and of evangelistic outreaches such as those offered by OAFC; saying that purpose of evangelism isn't to get new members, but to spread the Gospel. If someone is motivated to join by our congregation through our evangelism efforts, that's great; but that's not why we do evangelism.

I'd like to expand on that point here. The word "evangelism" comes from the original New Testament Greek "euangelion," and means "to share the good news," specifically sharing the Good News of the Gospel—the Good News of the life, suffering,

death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ for our salvation.

The first Christian evangelism efforts weren't done to gain congregation members—indeed there were no formal congregations among the Christians of Jesus' time, just informal groups of believers who met in private homes. And, the *motivation* for evangelism was *love*—loving others so much that individual Christians wanted to share with their

friends, neighbors, and relatives the Good News of salvation and eternal life through Jesus Christ. The motivation for evangelism then, and should be today, purely *outward*, not *inward*—not looking at what's in it for *us*, but what's in it for *them*.

Take, for example, the new believer Philip, in John chapter one. We read, "Philip found Nathanael and said to him, 'We have found him of whom Moses in the Law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth,

the son of Joseph.' Nathanael said to him, 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?' Philip said to him, 'Come and see.'" (John 1:45-46)

We don't know the relationship between Phillip and Nathanial; all we know is that "Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter" (John 1:44), that Andrew and Peter were fisherman; so possibly Phillip and Nathanial were also fisherman, and knew each other through that line of work. In any case, Phillip wasn't out looking for someone to add to the membership roster of a congregation—Phillip was reaching out in love, and joyfully sharing the Good News that he had found the promised Messiah, "him of whom Moses in the Law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth." (John 1:45)

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Nathanial wasn't immediately convinced, and most likely no one to whom we first witness will be immediately convinced of their need for "the Son of God... the King of Israel!" (John 1:49). But, we still reach out to them in love with the Good News of Jesus, praying that the Holy Spirit will work in their hearts the same faith which created in our hearts.

So-called "success" doesn't depend upon whether they become members of Faith Lutheran Church or not—the "success" is that we've shown *love* to those around us, to those in our communities, and to those around the world who need the assurance of the forgiveness of sins, Christ's closeness in *this* life, and His gift of *eternal* life. We interested in what's in it for *them*, loving others as Christ has loved us, and offered Himself up as the sacrifice for *our* sins and for the sins of the world.



"A Mighty Fortress is our God, a trusty Shield and Weapon."



From the "Reformation Psalm," Psalm 46: "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear though the earth gives way, though the mountains be moved into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains tremble at its swelling. The LORD of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress."



The Five Solas

The Five Solas are five Latin phrases (or slogans) that emerged during the Protestant Reformation and summarize the Reformers' basic beliefs and emphasis in

contradistinction to the teaching of the Roman Catholic of the day. "Sola" means "alone."

Faith alone (Sola Fide)

Justification (that is, becoming right before God) comes through faith only, not good works, though saving faith will always be accompanied by good works. This doctrine can be summarized with the formula "Faith yields justification and good works" and is contrasted with the Catholic formula "Faith and good works yield justification."

Scripture alone (Sola Scriptura)

The Bible is the only inspired and authoritative Word of God and is accessible to all. This doctrine is directly opposed to the teaching of the Catholic Church that Scripture can only be authentically interpreted through Holy Apostolic Tradition by the Magisterium (that is, the Pope and bishops at church councils).

Christ alone (Solus Christus)

Christ is the exclusive mediator between God and man. Neither Mary, the saints, nor priests (other than Christ himself) can act as mediator in bringing This doctrine is contrasted with the salvation. Catholic doctrines of the Intercession of Saints and of the function of priests.

Grace alone (Sola Gratia)

Salvation comes by grace only, not through any merit on the part of the sinner. Thus salvation is an unearned gift. This doctrine is a response to the Catholic doctrine of merit.

Glory to God alone (Soli Deo Gloria)

All the glory is due to God alone, since he did all the work—not only the atonement on the cross, but even granting the faith which allows men to be saved by that atonement. The Reformers believed that human beings (such as the Catholic saints and popes) and their organizations (the Church) were not worthy of the glory that was bestowed on them.

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Hay Ride & Weiner Roast!


Please plan to attend our family Hay Ride and Weiner Roast. This will be
